

Legislative Plaza from Friday, Oct. 11 to Sunday, Oct. 13.


Alana will also be our Chapter guest speaker on Thursday,

Ann Patchett is the 2012-2013 WNBA Award Recipient



Author Ann Patchett received the 2012-2013 WNBA Award on Sunday, June 9th, at Parnassus Books in Nashville, TN. The WNBA Award is presented every two years to a living American woman who derives part or all of her income from books or the allied arts and has done meritorious work in the world of books beyond the duties or responsibilities of her professional or occupation. Ann accepted this honor during the WNBA National Board Meeting, which was being held in Nashville at that time.

Ann Patchett, an award-winning author of several works of fiction and non-fiction, opened up the local bookstore, Parnassus Books, in 2011 with publisher Karen Hayes. While other independent bookstores were closing in the face of large chain-stores and online options, Ann become

a strong voice and advocate for independent bookstores not only in Nashville, but throughout the country. During her acceptance, one difference Ann noted between being an author and a bookstore owner is the opportunity to meet others in the community and engage in conversations regarding the latest and greatest literature.

The WNBA Award has been presented continuously since 1940. Previous recipients have included Doris Kearns Goodwin, Barbara Bush, Eleanor Roosevelt, Perri Klass and Kathi Kamen Goldmark.

Willodene Scott Summer Reading and Discussion Series

For the 23rd year, WNBA and Beaman Library offered to Nashville readers our summer activity, now named the Willodene Scott Summer Reading and Discussion Series. Willodene was the last survivor of the original charter members of the Nashville Chapter of WNBA. She always loved this summer program and supported it generously with her interest and also her financial support.

This series, "Based on the Book: Books into film" proved to be one of our most successful. The appeal of the book and film counterpoint worked well and attendance was strong for every session. Participation was enthusiastic, lively and informed and most had done their homework and came prepared to talk about it. About half of the attendees were participating for the first time and all were eager for a second round. The presenters were all superb. While reflecting the diversity of the selections, they all brought their own interpretations skillfully and with obvious command of their subject.

Dr. Kimberly Reed, Professor of French and English at Lipscomb, was the ideal person to help us explore Edith Wharton's *The Age of Innocence*. Kim has been a Wharton scholar for some time and is currently writing about her work. She clearly demonstrated Wharton's mastery of her world, - the social mores, the family, issues of loyalty and the difficulty of making choices. Dr. Reed also explored Wharton's ability to get under the façade and show the hypocrisy and the hidden flaws of her characters. Martin Scorsese's beautiful adaptation of the book was a departure from his prior films, but it was most successful, garnering five Oscar nominations, including Winona Ryder's win for Best Supporting Actress. This session set the tone for an exceptional summer of reading and viewing.

Some expressed a lack of affection for Ian McEwan's acclaimed novel, *Atonement*. However, those who braved the session regardless, found that nobody can completely resist a book when Austin Peay's bright and funny Linda Barnes is in charge of the discussion. McEwan is critically heralded as one of the very top British writers today, and *Atonement* judged his most complete and compassionate work to date. Beginning with a blissful summer evening in the English countryside, a crime is committed, a lie is told, and a young girl loses the soft bloom of innocence. Then the plot takes over. World War II begins, and the rest is reaction, ripple and attempting to repair—thus the atonement. The film faithfully renders the compelling book and the lingering questions left with the viewer about what atonement really entails.

As is always expected when a program such as this is planned and executed, circumstances arise unexpectedly that could mandate changes. Such was the case with the last session in June, when veteran presenter Dr. Matt Hearn had a death in his family. With much generosity and graciousness, Matt honored his commitment to the program and capably directed the session on Somorset Maugham's *The Razor's Edge*. This book, published in 1944, has sold over five million copies and generated two film versions. The story flows around expatriates living in Europe after World War I. One such character is Larry Darrell, traumatized by the war and in search of some more transcendent meaning in his life. In stark contrast is his fiancée's uncle, a shallow yet generous snob.

Issues such as materialism, eastern religion, and reversals of fortune, fuel the plot as Maugham, who plays the narrator of the story, brings their respective lifestyles to a conclusion. It was interesting to watch a black and white movie, well cast with stars Tyrone Power, Gene Tierney, Ann Baxter, (who won an Oscar for her role) and the delightful Clifton Webb. The 1984 version of the movie with Bill Murray, who played Darrell, was not a faithful adaptation of the novel and was not a commercial success.

Love in the Time of Cholera was a favorite choice – and who does not like a love story? Elizabeth Heffington, who speaks Spanish and has spent time in Latin American countries, sparkled as she led us through the story, the geography, the culture, and the beauty of Gabriel Garcia Marquez's language along with some background in literary "magic realism". Our participants were enthralled with the comic-tragic story, both sad and funny, its foolishness, and the drollery. While the movie version received less than warm enthusiasm from critics, our group thought it captured the essence of the story. The cinematography, scenery and costuming were sumptuous, and who could resist the charisma of Javier Bardem as Florentino?

Possession, A. S. Byatt's complex novel of the intersecting love stories of two Victorian poets and a modern counterpoint of academic literary researchers. The most dazzling aspect of the book, the invention of letters, poems and diaries from the 19th century, was a bit difficult for some readers, but in her engaging style and complete grasp of the work, Jan Harris showed the necessity for this device and its value to the book. She also explored with us the delightful characters and the "huge, intricately embroidered tapestry- a weaving of plot and syntax" so skillfully woven together for us. The film version was exceptionally well cast with a wonderful group of actors, and enhanced by the Victorian landscapes. Dr. Harris was presenting in the series for the first time and the group were united in their request for more of this talented teacher.

A welcome and appropriate ending to the series was the return of Steve Prewitt, who survived two serious heart surgeries during the past year. Steve is a veteran of this series and always a great favorite with our participants. Jay Parini's fictional account of Tolstoy's last months were captured in his novel, *The Last Station*. Parini is an amazing writer in any genre, and his portrayal of the Tolstoy family and the period encompassing his last months on earth were fascinating, as was the thorough examination of his life which Steve shared. Tolstoy enjoyed the rare experience of having been a writer who was an icon in his own time. The film version featured the incomparable Helen Mirren and Christopher Plummer, who won an Oscar as Tolstoy. As faithful to the book as a film version might be, all agreed it was pleasurable viewing and a learning experience as well.

The question posed at the conclusion of the session was, "Can we top this next summer?" Who knows?

NY Times Bestselling Author Headlines Writers' Conference

Murfreesboro, TN--July 24, 2013

Kevin Wilson, author of the novel *The Family Fang*, which has been optioned for a movie starring Nicole Kidman, will be the keynote speaker at the Middle Tennessee Writers' Conference on Sept. 28.

The conference is sponsored by The Writer's Loft, a non-degree writing program at Middle Tennessee State University. The event, which is open to the public, will include workshops in fiction, nonfiction, poetry and playwriting, says The Writer's Loft director Karen Alea Ford.

"Beginning and experienced writers will gain insight and inspiration from this extraordinary line-up of speakers, while getting to chat and mingle with the community of writers we have in Middle Tennessee," says director Ford. "We hope this conference will become an annual touchstone for anyone interested in writing."

In addition to Wilson, whose novel *The Family Fang* was on the *New York Times* Bestseller list as well as being named one of the Top Ten Books of 2011 by *Time, Esquire, Amazon, Barnes* and *Noble, People* and *Kirkus Review;* the event presents a roster of award-winning writers: poet Bill Brown (*Late Winter*), non-fiction writer Holly Tucker (*Bloodwork*), novelist Linda Busby Parker (*Seven Laurels*), playwright Claudia Barnett (*I Love You Terribly*).

"The Middle Tennessee Writers' Conference is a truly welcome addition to the state's literary scene: a great chance for up-and-coming writers in a the mid-state to learn from celebrated writers and outstanding teachers," said Margaret Renkl, editor of Chapter16.org, a daily source for literary news, interviews and reviews with a Tennessee focus.

Registration is open to all writers, and the fee covers all workshops and a buffet dinner. General admission is \$60; Writer's Loft alumni, MTSU faculty and students \$30; There is no fee for current Writer's Loft students.

The Writer's Loft non-degree writing program is open to anyone interested in being mentored by a professional writer of fiction, non-fiction, poetry and screenwriting. Students work from home, spending three semesters honing their skills and preparing for publication.

Mentors who work one-on-one with students include "The Bard of Hume-Fogg" Bill Brown, former *Tennessean* assistant editor and columnist Gloria Ballard, novelist and screenwriter Andrea Siegel (HBO, 2014 film release *Laggies* with Keira Knightly) and novelist Linda Parker Busby (University of S. AL, winner of the James Jones novel award), among others.
